That's why your Food Bank team will long and warmly remember the Kansas Gas Service employees and their family members who volunteered to take a busy day out of their own pressing holiday schedules and give those days to us to use freely any way we might choose.

Their assignment was to fill Christmas food boxes and to load food into backpacks used in our Food-4-Kids program. They quickly improvised an assembly line, got into rhythm and smiling all the way, filled 1,400 Christmas boxes and 2,800 back packs before the day was done, each and every one packed with an extra dollop of love and caring. A great job from some very special friends of the Food Bank.

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LINKING UP – We continue to be amazed by the creativity employed by school kids in their zeal to help the poor and needy. One recent example is the "Charity Chain" project of Earhart Environmental Magnet Elementary School students: A competition between three divisions of the student body to raise funds for charity, one quarter at a time.

The rules were simple: Each student in each division was responsible on his or her own to bring in quarters; each of which was recognized by a paper link in the charitable chain. At the end of the contest, there were 2,190 links, totaling \$547.50, a handsome and heartfelt contribution to the Kansas Food Bank for which we could not be more touched or more grateful.

SPECIAL FRIENDS – Service projects are a tradition in Quaker schools where children learn the importance of giving back to the community. This tradition is alive and well in Wichita Friends School, which recently chose the Food Bank to be the beneficiary of one of its community-sharing projects.

The project was a food-raising contest between all classes—prekindergarten to sixth grade—to determine which could collect the most. The combined amount at the end of the contest was 388 pounds delivered to us by a happy band of kids celebrating the joy of giving with some unforgettable smiles.
