Every now and then someone who doesn't know the KFB as well as you do will suffer a slip of the lip and call us the "Wichita Food Bank."

During our very early years that name may well have been a more fitting description than the one provided by our charter. The period in which our operations were "all about Wichita, all the time" ended in the early '90s when we began efforts to expand KFB hunger relief into less populated areas of our 73,000 sq. mile area service area with local area links in Garden City, Independence and Salina.

Since then, these early efforts have grown into a system that now works extremely well for 20 communities that supply pantries in all directions outside the Wichita-Sedgwick County trade area.

Working within the concept of our long established Rural Delivery Program, these drop off sites provide supplies for local area food pantries once each month throughout the year were established for designated communities in rural areas of our State. The system is now a well-spaced, still evolving checkerboard of HungerCare help for the nearly 100 food pantries depending on it all through the year.

The complementary system in Wichita serves hundreds of pantries that get their food directly at the Food Bank headquarters. All in all, a total of more than 7.4 million pounds of food was distributed during our last fiscal year, two-thirds of it in the Greater Wichita area, and one-third in the rural areas of our State.

**WHAT DOES LONG HURTFUL HUNGER FEEL LIKE?** No one knows better than those who have been captured on the battlefield and held as prisoners of war by their enemies in camps where starvation-level meals were most often the order of the day.

At the October meeting of the Air Capital Chapter of the American Ex-prisoners of War, the chapter expressed its special feelings of how it feels to be punished by near starvation in hostile prison camps by presenting a \$500 contribution to KFB Programs Manager Larry Gunkel who accepted it on behalf of the Food Bank. Chapter Commander John Mock stipulated that the gift was to go to the Laid-off Workers Fund. "As ex-prisoners of war, we know what it is like to be hungry," commented Commander Mock.

**CONGREGATING ON OUR BEHALF. AGAIN!** It's old news to us that our friends at University Congregational Church have unusually large and generous hearts. Their current gift raised at a "Come Together" brunch held at the church totaled \$2,704, until added to a Macy's Matching Grant. That doubled that contribution to \$5,408 which will provide 37,856 meals to those who would otherwise have missed that many. To UCC members Mimi Leo and Georgia Nix who put it on, and to all others who participated, we send deep and joyful gratitude, both from the Food Bank and on behalf of all those who will be warmed and strengthened by meals saved just for them.

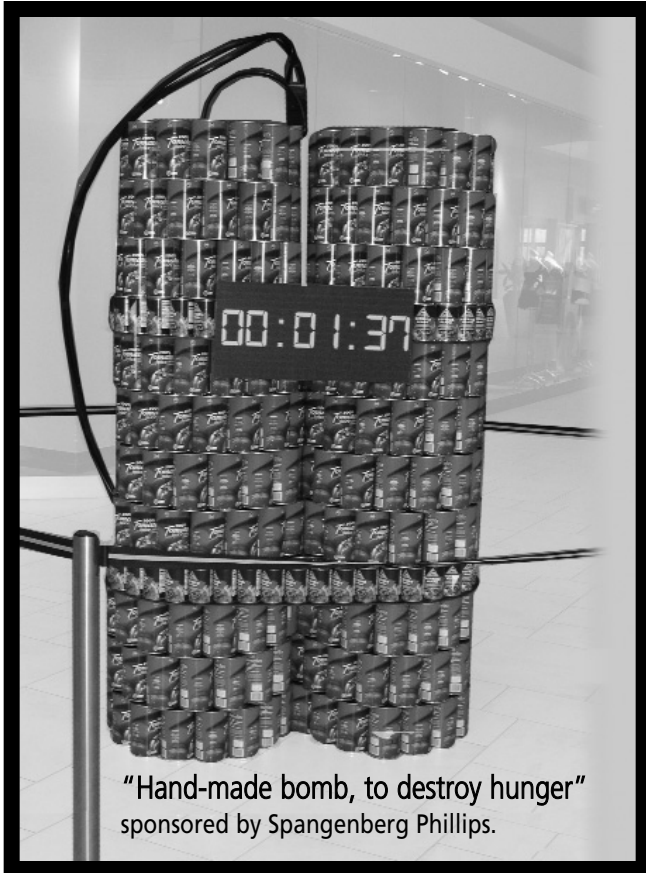

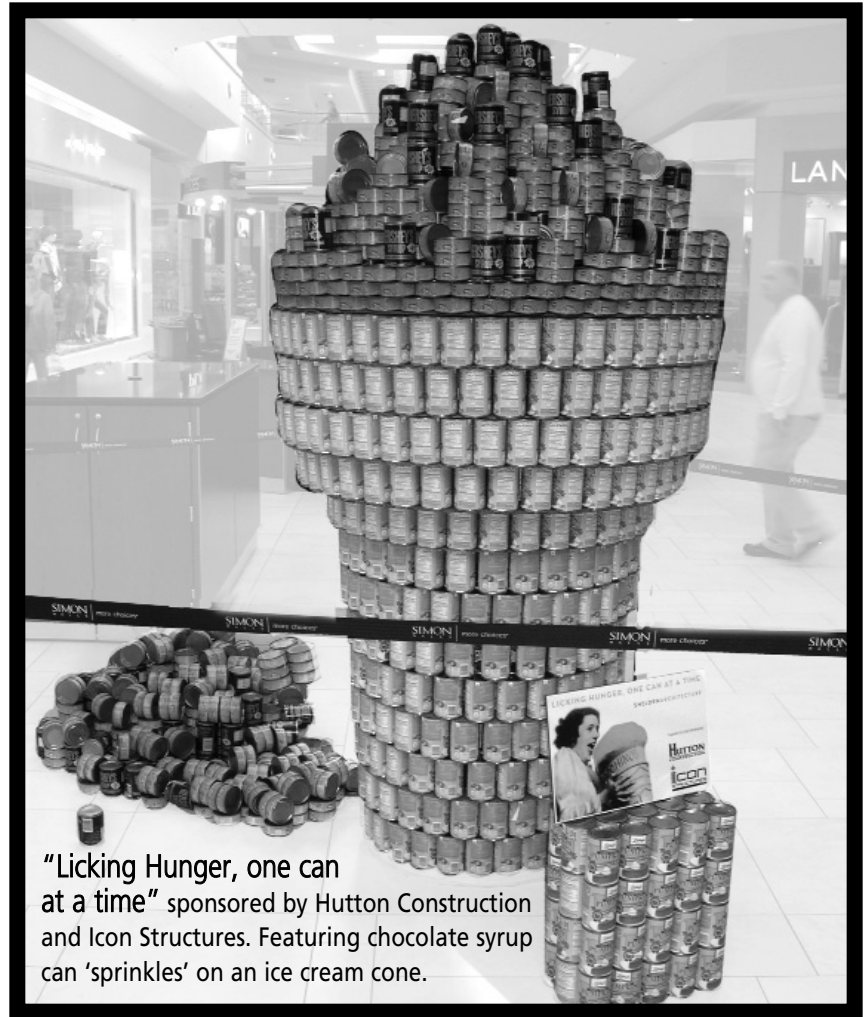

# CAN-DO ARCHITECTURE ON DISPLAY

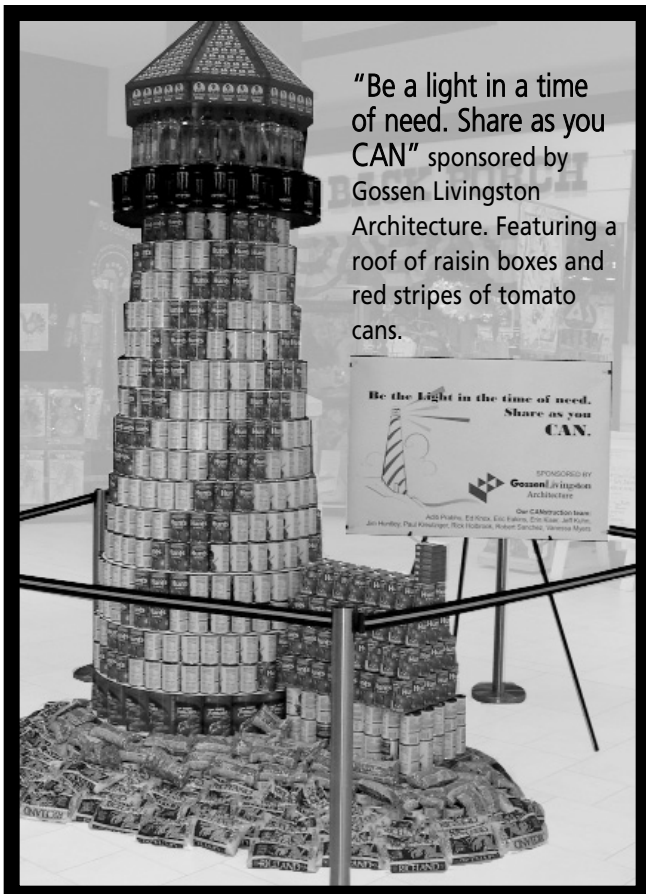
