This is the third time we've been awarded the ConAgra Hunger-Free Summer Grant to assist with the summer meal program! We were first awarded in 2010, then last year and now this year.

## VOLUNTEER PROFILE: LOCAL YOUTH CHOOSES KANSAS FOOD BANK FOR EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT

ne of the very best ways to direct neighbors to a mobile pantry distribution is with good, old-fashioned signage.
But that's something we didn't yet have.

About a year ago, Jarrett Barton approached the Kansas Food Bank about completing his Eagle Scout project with us. He wanted to do something that would make a difference in his community.

When we met with Jarrett, we knew just what he could do to make a meaningful impact. We decided as a team that it would be a great help to have him produce signage for our mobile pantry distributions. We needed the signs to be sturdy enough to withstand the strong Kansas winds, especially in western Kansas, and they'd need to be easy to transport and store.

Jarrett did his research, presented a design — which we approved — then brought a mock-up sample for our team's review. In the end, his finished project was amazing!

Jarrett even used recycled materials in producing the signs.

The consulting, design and production process required more than 300 hours of Jarrett's time — and the Kansas Food Bank now has 15 sturdy, attractive new signs to



let hungry neighbors know where they can pick up fresh produce and other nutritious groceries right where they live, work and play.

We're so very proud of Jarrett and want to extend our heartfelt thanks

to him for choosing the Kansas Food Bank for his Eagle Scout Project!

onica's family has fallen on tough times. She told us she had to stop working at a local home siding business due to severe arthritis and fibromyalgia — the pain just got to be too much. In fact, her pain and weakness recently caused her to fall, and she suffered a nerve injury.

Right now, the only income Ronica has to provide for her two growing teenage boys, Ronnie and Jerimiah, is a small amount of disability assistance. Raising her sons on her own was hard enough, but without her weekly paychecks, their financial situation is really tough.

"I pray every day that things will get better," Ronica says. She's proactive about improving her family's situation — she recently began applying for office jobs that are less physically demanding, and she's hopeful she'll have an income again soon.

But until then, Ronica and her boys will continue to struggle. When we spoke, she admitted she'd gone to bed hungry earlier that week to ensure Jerimiah and Ronnie were able to have dinner.

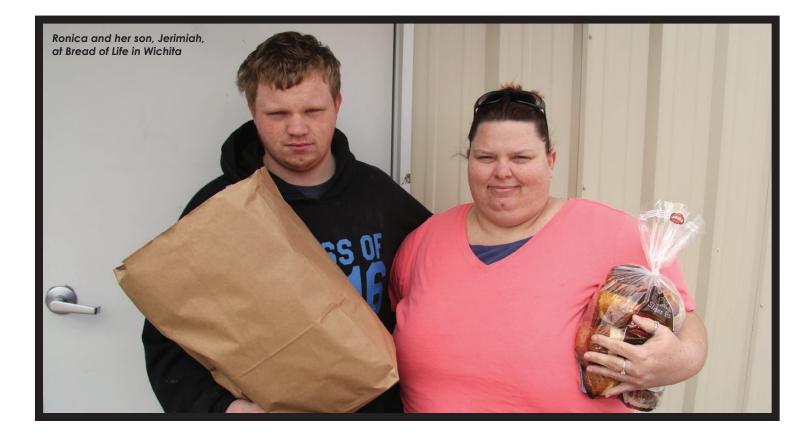
No parent should ever have to go without to fill their children's plates.

roviding all the things kids need to grow and prosper every day can be difficult on a single income. Stacey knows from experience. She's held multiple jobs in retail, as a certified nurse assistant and working heavy construction — and all the labor has taken a toll on her health.

Stacey has both osteo- and rheumatoid arthritis, as well as lupus and fibromyalgia. It's hard for her to spend time on her feet, lift things and move around.

Her sweet young daughters — Madison, 11, and Taylor, 12 — have assumed the household responsibilities and help her out a lot. She appreciates them dearly and does her best to meet all their needs.

But unfortunately, Stacey often can't stretch her limited disability income to afford enough food to fill the family's table. She says sometimes she must sacrifice her own good nutrition to ensure her children are fed.

"I always make sure that the kids eat first before taking care of myself," Stacey says.

Madison and Taylor attend Meadowlark Elementary in Pittsburg, where they participate in the *Food 4 Kids* program at their school. Each Friday, the girls take home backpacks filled with healthy, kid-friendly snacks to last through the weekend.

The program has helped supplement Stacey's food budget, and she says Taylor and Madison have loved every item in their bags. The food helps them stay focused and active. Taylor's creative — she loves drawing and playing viola. Madison's an athlete and is into soccer and basketball. Your gifts are keeping them happy and healthy with access to quality food when they need it most.

"Thank you so much for thinking about us in this time of need," Stacey says.
