CONNIE PUTS HEALTHY FOOD ON THE TABLE



To support the health and well-being of her family, Connie visits Bread of Life Food Pantry, a Kansas Food Bank Partner Agency, to pick up nutritious groceries. She appreciates the variety of food she receives from healthy snacks to nourishing ingredients for balanced meals.

The food pantry has been a big help to Connie for several years. When she first started visiting, she was still raising her oldest two children who are now grown.

"I was really on disability at the time, and I was trying to raise [my] kids," Connie explains.

GARDEN CITY UPDATE

Since the opening of our new hub in Garden City, we have been able to expand our mobile produce distributions in southwest Kansas to twice a month. In addition, we have added a special monthly distribution at a low-income housing complex in Garden City, focusing on all fresh produce.

Our Food 4 Kids program served 6,560 kids in 340 schools across Kansas and counting—helping ensure children have healthy food when they no longer have access to meals typically provided at school.



SENIORS

No one should have to choose between groceries and other basic needs — especially our seniors. Through our senior-focused programs, we provide a consistent source of nutritious food and a sense of dignity for older Kansans living on limited incomes. This past year, we proudly distributed more than 241,000 meals to seniors — ensuring that our parents, grandparents and neighbors have the nourishment everyone deserves.







Mobile Pantries

This past year, our mobile pantries hit the road to bring food directly into communities and neighborhoods where regular brick-and-mortar pantries don't exist. By meeting people right where they are, we reduce barriers like distance and transportation —ensuring families have access to healthy food. In total, 369 mobile pantry distributions were deployed, reaching 31,432 households and putting thousands of missing meals on tables across Kansas.

This seems to be Joaquin's life mission — to help others.

Joaquin started volunteering at our Garden City warehouse earlier this year. The opening of this facility has expanded volunteer opportunities, and volunteers help assemble *Food 4 Kids* packets, bag produce, build food boxes and help place nutritious food into the hands of our neighbors.

"I was looking for a place or an organization that I could be part of," Joaquin says.

Growing up, Joaquin was told by a guidance counselor that he wasn't college-bound, but he went on to earn a bachelor's degree and a master's degree. He helped students dream of new possibilities for themselves. He

shares that one of his proudest achievements was starting a local high school soccer program.

"That [program] kept a lot of kids from dropping out," Joaquin says.
"Once [the kids] found out there were scholarships, and that they could do the academic work, many... became teachers, nurses, even doctors."

For people looking to volunteer, Joaquin says, "Come over with me. Try it once... see what the Food Bank is doing — how they help others — and then decide."

I gnacio, 80, is a proud and loving husband and father. He enjoys spending time with his family.

"[My grandkids and great grandkids] always want me to push them in their little car," Ignacio says, "and they want me to dance with them."

Ignacio and his wife of 60 years have lived in Garden City for 42 years. The couple has created a legacy to be proud of.

"We raised our daughters with a lot of love, and there's always been a lot of love in the family," says Ignacio.

The family's close-knit bond has helped them weather many

challenges including the declining health of Ignacio's wife.

"One of my daughters takes care of my wife during the day, and the other at night," Ignacio shares.

Since Ignacio retired, it has been a challenge for him to afford enough healthy food for his wife and daughters who live with him.

"We live off our [Social Security] check, but right now it's not enough because everything is so expensive," Ignacio says.

YOU HELP LACEY PROVIDE FOR HER FAMILY


Lacey, 26, has a really big heart. Not only does she care for her son, 6, and her twin daughters, 3, but she also helps take care of her brother's 4 kids who range in age from 4 months to 13 years old.

Lacey's priority is for all seven kids in their combined household to have healthy food. And to make that happen, she visits the Decatur County Food Pantry in Oberlin, a Kansas Food Bank agency partner.

Now, her entire family, including four adults and seven kids, has access to healthy food.

"My kids go to bed with full bellies and that's all I could ask for," Lacey says. "We [aren't] going to go hungry. I never have to worry if this is going to stretch far enough."

Lacey often cares for the kids and runs the house on her own and she shares that she takes it "one step at a time." Her sister-in-law has a severe mental health condition, and Lacey's husband leaves for work for a week at a time.



Thankfully, Lacey's parents live close and help her sometimes, especially on Saturday's so she can go to work herself.

For partners like you, Lacey says, "Everything matters. Every can. Every package of dried potatoes. It matters. And inevitably, it's going to change somebody's life."

Thank you. We are so grateful for your partnership that is making a profound difference for so many families across Kansas — just like Lacey's.
